GALLAGHER AND OTHERS BEATEN BY "RED SQUAD"

Committee of Fifty Came to Protest John Reed Club Raid

LOS ANGELES, Feb. 16.—In what was the most vicious police attack on workers this city has seen, sixty of the infamous Hynes Red Squad were ordered by the chambers fifty representatives of iberal, artists and workers organizations who had come to protest the vandalism of Hynes gangsters in wrecking the John Reed Club House and valuable frescoes there last Saturday night. In the fight Leo Gallagher, attorney of the International Labor Defense; Karl Hama, A. Murray, Federated Press representative; Dr. Clinton Taft of the American Civil Liberties Union: Ezra Chase of the Workers Ex-Servicemen's League; Basil Dell, and several unidentified workers and John Reed Club members were

Hitler Raises Food Prices

BERLIN, Germany, Feb. 13.—One of the first acts of the Hitler regime was to increase the import duties on cattle and lard. The duties on cattle runs on an average to 100% and on lard 500%.

The effect is an immediate rise in the prices of these most essential products consumed by the workers. The U.S. is the chief lard exporter.

Crisis Deepens in France

PARIS, France, Feb. 13.—The number of those receiving Unem ployment Insurance has jumped to 223,902. The actual number of jobless is at least four times as much, as few are entitled to the insurance. The Banque De Province closed its doors, It has 150 branches in many of the provinces.

Sandino's Men Won't Submit to Betraval

MANANGUA, Nicaragua, Feb. 13.—Two of Sandino's officers were xecuted for insubordination. One Col. Joan Altimirano is the brother of Pedron Altimirano who is reported to be leader of a considerable part of Sandino's forces, refusing to submit to the betrayal.

Sandino issued a special call to his former followers, in which he states that those who will not give up their arms will be pursued with his assistance. Sanding is now a willing tool of U.S. imperialism

Argentina Farm Strike Spreads

BUENOS AIRS, Argentina, Feb. 15.—Entre Rios, leader of the great farm strike now spreading, was arrested after addressing a meeting of 1000. He was scheduled for exile but the increased determination on the part of the strikers forced his immediate release.

The latest province to join the strike is Cordoba. There is virtually a state of martial law.

Martial Law Continues in Roumania

SPREAD THE FIGHT AGAINST FARM SALES

The wave of struggles sweeping through the farming districts against foreclosures, now effects at least 10 states. This is no mere agitation movement.

It is because daily thousands of farmers rally to each foreclosure sale, and either prevent them or force the sales for a few cents later returning the properties to the owner that the leading insurance companies have decided to suspend foreclosure activities in many parts.

The farmers are fast learning the value of mass action and organization. In four states conferences have already been organized, uniting many farmers organizations to raise the struggle to a higher stage.

But thus far the movement is mainly confined to the middle west. As yet it has not assumed a mass expression throughout the west. But this is not because there is a lack of foreclosures. Tens of thousands are facing a loss of their farms along the entire coast. There are counties in Arizona or New Mexico with two-thirds of the farms facing foreclosure. However there will be no effective struggle without an organization to lead it.

Such an organization is the United Farmers League. There were large delegations of farmers in the recent State Hunger Marches representing many farming districts. The Western Worker and other workers publications are read by thousands of western farmers. But there are very few branches of the United Farmers League

As the first step to spread the fight over the Rockies to the coast, groups of small farmers should be getting together to form United Farmers League branches. In this our Communist Party organizations must give leadership.

Almost with the very first news that told of the attempt to assassinate Roosevelt, the lying capitalist press was already sowing seeds in the minds of the people, for a campaign to link the "Reds" with the affair.

Immediately "plans to investigate red activities" were announced, and the Dies Bill for wholesale deportation of foreign born which was thoroughly discredited in the nation-wide campaign and had slim chances to be passed, was already acted upon favorably in the house.

We Communists have nothing in common with acts of individual terror as of the registered Republican Zangara and always held the Anarchists among our worst enemies, as they through such provocative actions, give objective support to the bosses, as already demonstrated in this case. Police terror is a strong provocation to counter-terror. But only weaklings will yield to the temptation.

The chief guide to Communist tactics, is that they must be based on MASS ACTIVITY. This is demonstrated everywhere. Be it a fight against a single water shut off, an eviction, a farm foreclosure, war preparations, frame up or for any demands. That is how our Party becomes a mass party.

The bosses and their press know our position but if such an incident be used for letting loose a greater reign of terror to put down the ever growing movement against starvation, why not take advantage?

However, they are only attempting to use tactics which were found temporarily successful in 1919 and 1920, when the militant workers movement was in its infancy. We have a different situation now. Behind the Communist Party and revolutionary organizations is a powerful mass movement. 
