

SMALL FARMERS WITH STRIKERS: 20,000 EFFECTED

800 Already Out in Bakersfield Area; Relief Needed

TULARE, Calif., Oct. 2.— The final strike conference, representing 25 locals of the Cannery and Agricultural Workers Industrial Union, with 4000 organized workers, over a cotton acreage of 100,000, set the general strike in San Joaquin valley for Wednesday, Oct. 4. Picket defense and relief committees have been organized, ready for the big walkout.

Ten workers have been arrested at Wasco.

Eight hundred are already out at Bakersfield, Earlimart, Lerdo and at Corcoran. The strike is beginning in southern regions and will One of the 1700 of striking sweep northward as the crop ripens. ARIZONA COTTON STRIKE CONTINUES: **DEMANDS REJECTED**

Boss Arbitration Committee Only Aimed To Split Workers Ranks

PHOENIX, Ariz., Sept. 28.—Gov. Moeur's committee to arbitrate in the present cotton strike refused all demands presented for the strikers by Clay Naff. Only on one did they admit the fairness of the demand, that of abolition of child labor, and then declared, "a law already exists in this matter."

The committee was H. M. Watson, member of the NRA Board; W. L. Smith, big Glendale rancher: E. H. Fitzgerald, Federal Concilliator; J. Ney Miles, chairman of the Industrial Commission, and Clay Naff of the Agricultural Workers Industrial Union, militant leaders of the strike.

UNPAID WORKERS IN L. A. TAKE STORE TO GET WAGES

Throw Out Manager and Pocket Day's Receipts

LOS ANGELES, Sept. 29. - A large crowd outside of "Busy Dan's" restaurant, 317 South Main street, attracted my attention one evening recently. Though the "Blue Buzzard" was prominently displayed in the window of this place, the slogan, "We do our part," proved to be a lie.

Business was at a standstill. In side the restaurant, some of the employees were engaged in red-hot argument with some blue coats. During the day sugar, cakes, dough nuts and other food had been car ried away by the employes.

Being tired of working week after week without getting their wages, the 30 employes went to the authorities time and again, trying to collect. Nothing was done about it, however, so the workers held a meeting, threw out the manager, and took over the management of the restaurant themselves. This litthe Main street "Soviet" closed up "Busy Dan's" for good.

One young direct-actionist told the crowd that he had enriched himself by \$6 in cash that day, without asking his boss-a boss who regularly "forgot" to pay his employees. Every one of the workers in the restaurant put all the money they took in that day into their own pockets. Not a cent went into the cash register.

No arrests were made for this open "lawlessness." They were afraid to take this case to court, lest the publicity become a boomerang against the "New Deal."

HUNG JURY ON TRIALS OF 8

C. P. Candidate, T.U.U.L. Leader, and 48 Others Stand Trial Oct. 4

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 28.-"Hung" jury" was the result of the trial of eight striking cigarmakers arrested Sept. 9th, and charged with violation of the anti-picketing ordinance, because they carried banners and "talked in a loud manner" when the police advanced trial was set for Oct. 2.

The cigarmakers of Marca Petri and E. Goss Co. are still on strike. The other factories have granted the strikers demands.

On Wednesday, Oct. 4, at 10 a. m. in Judge Steiger's court. Hall of Justice, 50 other workers arrested on the eigarmakers picket line will go on trial. Among them are Walter Lambert, district organizer of the TUUL, and Jack Bishop, Communist Party candidate for Supervisor in the coming city elections on the workers' ticket. All of the workers are being defended

All workers and sympathizers are called on to attend the trials, and to send protests to Judge Steiger and Gov. Rolph, demanding the immediate unconditional release of all the arrested strikers and their leaders. Defense funds are urgently needed. SEATTLE, Sept. 25. - Several hundred workers attended the funeral Friday, Sept. 22, of F. C. Heiss, as a protest against conditions which caused his death from starvation. A capacity crowd heard Bill Dobbins, president of the Unemployed Citizens League, and George Bradley, organizer of the State Committee of Action, give the Red funeral speeches at the Hall of the Unemployed Citizens

League. Following these the crowd marched en masse on the County-City building, "not to mourn, but in order that we shall not have to mourn," as one of their spokesmen

ON BAY BRIDGE WORK PROVE ONLY

Scales Set Through Impartial Wage Board Completely Forgotten

OAKLAND, Sept. 30.—Before the beginning of the much ballyhooed Bay Bridge, East Bay papers ran series of articles on the high wages contractors would be forced to pay in order to bid on the Bridge jobs. A so-called "impartial" wage board was called together Jan. 1. 1933, to set a wage scale for all work in the East Bay district.

But the workers found that the board's decisions mean scab wages; the stories of high wages were only lies. Kaiser, Inc., who is one of the six big contractors at Boulder Dam, and has a contract to supply materials for the Bay Bridge, is only paying 50c an hour for a six-hour day—where the wage calls for 75c an hour. Welders and burners are receiving only 60c an hour. Mechanics are supposed to get \$1 an hour, but Kaiser is paying them 50c.

The workers are forced to show up each shift, without knowing whether they are going to work or not. The bosses on the job refuse to work, so the workers never

MASS REVOLT GROWS IN CUBA

HAVANA, Cuba, Oct. 2,-Provocative shots into a mass demonstraion, from the reactionary former army officers entrenched in the Nacional Hotel, were the cause of an all-day battle today in which more than a hundred are reported killed, and many more wounded. The officers were finally forced out. The accidental killing of an American is being used by the pro-intervention forces for inciting American intervention. he U. S. Navy Department has already directed the Atlantic fleet to a Florida point that is only four hours sailing from Cuban

A general strike covering the entire island has been called, as vorkers in the interior proceeded to occupy more factories. Last week was marked by the greatest demonstration yet seen, arranged by the Communists. This was on the occasion of the arrival of the ashes of the Cuban revolutionary martyr, Julio Mella. The procession marched to the waterfront, and was mainly directed against Yankee imperialism.

Soviet Shatters Stratosphere Record

MOSCOW, USSR, Sept. 30.—The world's stratosphere record was ompletely shattered, by three Soviet scientists, who went up in a overnment balloon, reaching a height of 11 miles and 1406 yards. Ten miles and 117 yards was attained previously by Professor Picard of

Far from being satisfied with the record achieved, an attempt will e made to reach a still greater height.

The success gives the lie to the boss press throughout the world which very gleefully ridiculed the Soviet Union when the balloon refused to rise last week, due to moist weather.







O'CONNELL FOR COMPANY UNION

During the past three months, thousands of Longshoremen in San Francisco and other coast ports joined the International Longshoremen's Assn., affiliated with the A. F. of L. The reason was chiefly because the workers are anxious to break with the much hated "Blue Book" company union (Longshoremen's Assn. of S. F.), which is controlled by the shipowners, and is a tool in their hands to keep a real union off the waterfront.

Furthermore the workers were told by I. L. A. officials that if they want to reap the "benefits" of the NRA they should join a "real" union, as the International Longshore-

men's Assn. is termed.

The workers thought that the I. L. A. would immediately fight the company union and its control on the waterfront. But thus far all the workers got was promises and told to have confidence in the NRA. Virtually all San Francisco membership meetings to date ended at the point when a longshoreman would move that no more dues be paid the Blue Book, or for similar action. At such a point all the tricks and bureaucratic methods known to Holman and his henchmen would be used to adjourn the meeting.

When rank and file workers, disgusted with this dilly dallying would take initiative and defy the boss organization, the Holman officialdom would be careful that it was not in anyway officially implicated. This was most brazenly demonstrated recently when the workers walked off the Matson dock when asked for the Blue Books, and tore up the books and threw them on the streets. But despite the demand that the example of the Matson workers be followered everywhere, no move was made, for "the NRA will settle everything.'

And the NRA, with the help of the A. F. of L., to which the longshoremen are affiliated, did settle.

The issue between the two unions came before the NRA adjustment board and over the signatures of Irving F. Reichert, J. A. Pettis, and John O'Connell, the "Blue Book" union is found to be "not a company union and is not under the control and domination of the Waterfront Employers Union," and that "the Longshoremen's Assn. of S. F. (Blue Book) and the Waterfront Employers Union have entered into a legal, valid and binding contract enforceable at law. The NRA Board of Adjustment has no right to abrogate this contract. For Longshoremen to obtain the benefits of this contract they must belong to the Longshoremen's Assn. of S. F."

SMALL FARMER. WORKER UNITE IN STRUGGLE

The strike of the California cotton pickers is of great significance because it is the first in the industry for a ploited workers in the state. But the feature that should attract the widest attention from the agricultural workers and small farmers is the fact that it shows in actual practice how the workers and small farmers are united in struggle. The theories of the I. W. W. or such as the Socialist Labor Party, and similar sects, that all farmers belong to the exploiting class, are shattered completely by such living experiences.

For weeks in preparation for the strike, the United Farmers League, an organization of the small farmers in the district, co-operated with the workers, because one of the chief strike demands is that the Finance Companies who have already contracted for the purchase of the cotton crop, shall raise the price to the farmers. The small farmer realizes that his position is similar to that of the worker. In face of the cost of living rising, he must turn over the crop for a price that was already set, which will not leave him anything for even an existence. Both he and the agricultural worker face the common exploiter—the

Finance Companies, who reap the profits. The small farmers immediately declared their willingness to accept the demands of the workers, for \$1.00 per hundred and recognition of the union.

The action taken in the cotton fields should serve as an example for all similar situations. In this manner, struggles will serve as a means for uniting the two giant forces against capitalism.

In this manner the attempts of the large growers to organize the mass of small farmers into their terror squads against strikers will fail!


