Weisbord Speaks to Chicago Children.

ON Saturday afternoon, December 18, Albert Weisbord, organizer and leader of the Passaic Textile Strike, spoke to a large audience of children at a meeting organized by the Spartakus Pioneer Section of Chicago, with the help of the Freiheit Children's Chorus. Before the meeting started we had a lot of singing. After we had cheered Comrade Weisbord he started to tell us about the Pioneers and the children in the Passaic strike.

He showed us of what great help the children were in the strike, how useful they were in finding scabs and how good they were on the picket line.

In the schools the Pioneers were also on the job. They would ask the teacher so many hard questions about the strike which the teacher couldn't answer right (because the teacher has to speak for the bosses) that the children began to believe that the Pioneers could teach the teachers.

He told us that when the International Workers' Aid opened play grounds then the city opened them too. But the workers' children would not go to the city play grounds but they went to the workers' play grounds. We Must Carry Out the Work Liebknecht Died For!

IT is now eight years that Karl Liebknecht and Rosa Luxemburg were brutally murdered because they were such good fighters for the working people. They were killed on January 15, 1919.

Liebknecht's great work was fighting against militarism and helping to organize the young workers. The old Socialists, who were already beginning to betray the workers, didn't like the work he was doing and they tried in every way to hinder him but they couldn't stop him very much.

When the war broke out most of the Socialists and trade union leaders went right over to the side of the kaiser and told the workers to go out and fight for the bosses. But Liebknecht and Luxemburg and his small band—the Spartakus League—stood firm and told the workers the truth and led the workers against the war. For that Liebknecht was put into prison.

Finally the German workers got tired of the war and started a revolution. The kaiser was overthrown and Liebknecht was let out of prison. But the workers still believed in the fake socialists and let them lead the government. Just as these fake So-

cialists had before supported the kaiser's war as now they went ahead suppressing the workers and handing the government over to the bosses. Liebknecht and his friends cried out against this and told the workers that they must really do in order to have a workers' government. For this the fake Socialists made a conspiracy with the old kaiser officers and butchered many hundreds of good workers and killed Liebknecht and Luxemburg.

Liebknecht's great fight and heroic death is a great source of inspiration for the revolutionary workers and workers' children the world over. The

ON January 21, 1924, the world first heard the terrible news: Lenin is Dead! A shudder went thru millions and millions of workers and farmers in every country of the world, from Canada to Australia, from France to China. Lenin is Dead!

Why is this? What did and what does Lenin mean to the workers' and farmers' children the world over.

Lenin was the greatest leader the workers had in the struggle for freedom from the bosses and rich men. Lenin led the Russian workers to freedom. Lenin showed the workers of the world the way to freedom. Lenin was the comrade, the teacher, the guide—the leader of millions of toilers all over the world.

LENIN began his work of organizing and teaching the workers many long years ago. While he was still a boy (Lenin was born in April, 1870)



his elder brother, Alexander, was murdered by the czar for his revolutionary activities. This only made Lenin more determined and more obstinate in his struggle against the czar, the landlords and the capitalists. In his

long years of work among the Russian workers Lenin was arrested and sent to prison many times, but that did not stop him at all. He remained faithful thruout his life to the cause of the working class. This is Lenin's first law for Pioneers.

LENIN succeeded in getting together the best and most intelligent and most militant workers in Russia and forming them into the Bolshevik (Communist) Party. This party took the lead of the workers in the struggle for freedom, just like the Workers (Communist) Party does in this country.

WHEN the war broke out, the Russian czar and land owners and capitalists told the Russian workers and go out to fight for their "country". Lenin showed that these rich men wanted the workers to go out and fight for the rich men's benefit, to increase his profits. Lenin said the workers must fight not against other workers but against their real enemies, the bosses. Many people who up to that time were supposed to be Socialists (that is, leaders in the fight for freedom) were for the war and Lenin showed that they were no longer Socialists or friends of the workers, but were now tools of the bosses. How true this was you can see from the fact that one of these fake "Socialists" later tried to kill Lenin.

CHILD LABOR

HERE in this "great free country" where "there is education for everybody" (if you're able to get it) we have more than anywhere else in the world—Child Labor.

Millions of children under 16 work in various places such as mills, mines, canneries, beet and cotton fields, streets, theaters, buildings, farms, and so on.

The children who work in these places are very young. Many of them start working at five years of age. Five years! Think of it! Before they've even gone to school for a half year.

You might think that these little children couldn't produce very much. Well, they produce enough to satisfy their boss and that's going pretty far (bosses are not very easy to satisfy). Here are a few examples of children who work in the cotton fields picking cotton: "One child five years old picked 2,000 pounds of cotton in three months. His average per day was 81 pounds."

"Another child, also five years old, also picked 72 pounds of cotton for a whole season." Those are only a few examples of children that produce very much. I could give enough examples to fill a book.

In Utah schools close regularly because the children are needed to work in the beet fields. Think of that. Just because the capitalists want more children to work and make profits for them, so they close down the schools and get the children out of them. Now, who will say that the bosses don't own and control the schools?

Most bosses get their child slaves out of school without letting the public know about it very much. They give the children's parents very low wages and then if the family doesn't

come into a certain part of the factory where you can hardly breathe. When I got out of that part I sure was glad. In Ford's factory every worker has his own job. One worker has to screw a screw all day long. And if anything happens they give you a job which lasts a week or more and then they fire you.

The power house is the last stop in this trip. There the men have to wear white clothes so as to look clean and make people think the whole factory is as clean

IN February, 1917, the Russian people could stand the war no longer and revolted. They overthrew the czar. Then the fake "Socialists" who had told and were still telling the workers to go to war for the benefit of the rich, stepped in and said: "We'll take care of the government for you. You know, we're your friends." They meant of course, to hand over the government again to the bosses and rich men. The workers did not understand things so well and they followed these tools of the bosses. But Lenin and his Bolshevik Party began clearing up the minds of the workers and showing them that these fake Socialists were only playing the game of the bosses. Finally, in October, 1917, the Bolsheviks had the workers behind them and they kicked out the fake Socialists from the government and took it over for the workers and farmers. Then the Workers and Farmers' Government kicked out the landlords, the bosses and other rich men and gave over the land to the farmers and the factories to the workers. The Russian workers and farmers were free!

But Lenin is dead! But Lenin has shown us the way. Lenin lives in the heart of every Communist! Lenin lives in the heart of every honest worker and poor farmer. Lenin lives in the heart of every Pioneer and militant working class child.

The Pioneers must organize labor sports for the workers' children.

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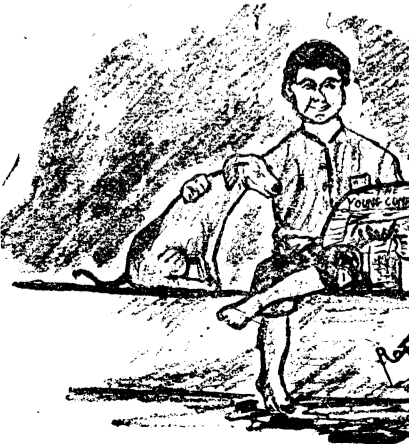

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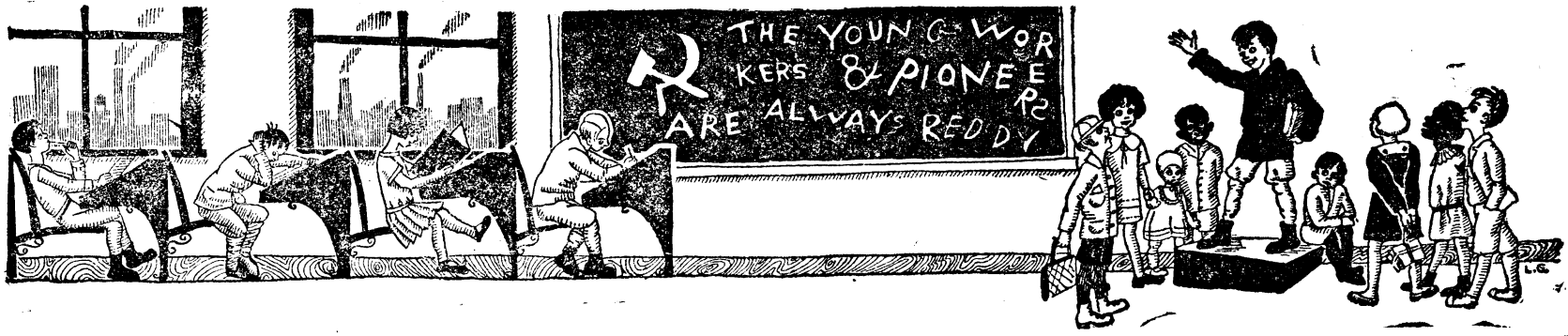

In one case we put up a big poster way up between the first and second stories (we had to go at night to do it) so that nobody could take it off. We also talked to lots of children in school and told them about the picture. As a result we had over two hundred children at the showing in our section. This shows that school work gets results.
