This latest instruction of Chairman Mao's is a new development of Marxist-Leninist theory on party building. It is a great program for streamlining and building our party. In order to reorganize our party well, we must firmly grasp this link.

How can our party be well reorganized? The editorial says: In the past, the struggle between the two lines has always existed in the course of organizing our party. The handful of capitalist-roaders within the party have consistently pursued China's Khrushcev's line on party building. Great numbers of party members, poisoned by "self-cultivation," served as their tools for bringing about a restoration of capitalism.
